

Got Cats?

Charlton Animal Control started to assist with the town's stray cats in 2008. A big part of our cat program has included education on the importance of spaying and neutering. Being able to offer resources and referrals to Charlton residents is a great way for us to help reduce pet overpopulation.

Here is some interesting information on cats. Cats can go into their first heat as young as 4 1/2 - 5 months of age. Heat lasts about 7 days, but can go on for 3 weeks. Females may go into heat repeatedly until impregnated (or spayed). The average gestation period is 63 days. Cats can get pregnant again while nursing a litter. A common statistic: one female cat and one male cat and their kittens can produce 470,000 cats in seven years. Neutering male cats reduces fighting, roaming, and spraying behaviors as well as the spread of cat diseases such as feline leukemia and aids.

Having your new cat or kitten spayed or neutered, if it isn't already, is imperative to reduce cat overpopulation. Cats 6 months and over are also required to have a rabies vaccination. Spaying and neutering can be expensive, but there are low cost spay/neuter/vaccination programs available near Charlton.
